**SOUTH AFRICA:
Opportunities for Virginia
wood exports in a leading
African market.**

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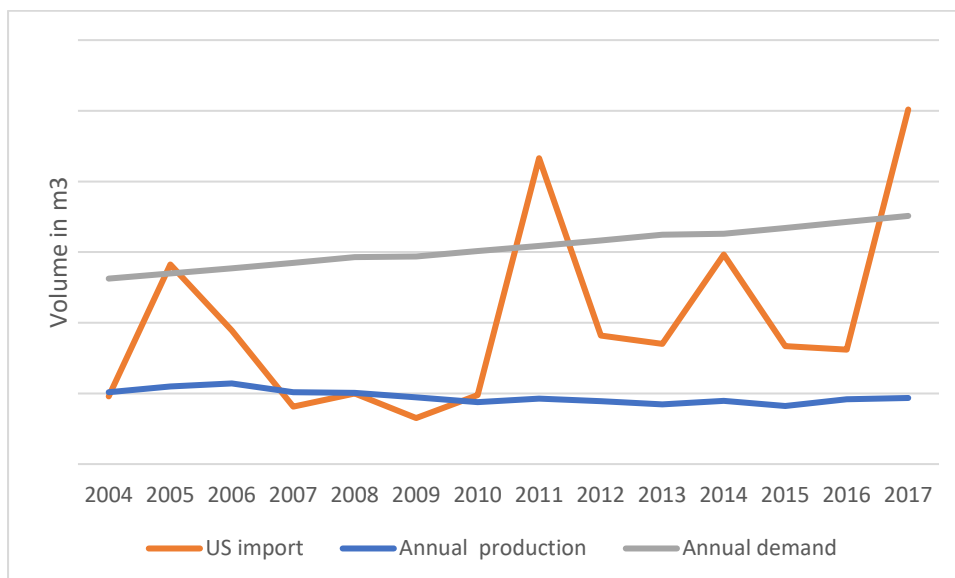
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Executive Summary

South Africa and the rest of the SADC region have been importing substantial volumes of wood and wood products from the US and the rest of the world. The US is one of the top 10 wood and wood products exporters to South Africa in terms of value. There was a dramatic increase in the wood and wood products imported by South Africa from the US. Wood which falls under the category of wood sawn or chipped lengthwise, sliced or peeled, whether or not planed, sanded or end-jointed, of a thickness of more than 6mm, increased by 17 million m³ between 2018 and 2019. If the status quo of the forestry industry in South Africa remains, demand for imported wood and its products will continue to grow over the next 5-10 years. It is expected that the annual demand for wood will rise continuously. A depiction of the trends based on proxies¹ of the US wood imports by South Africa, between 2004 and 2017 is shown below. The graph also shows the predicted annual demand and production of round wood production.

Timber production in South Africa has been declining and is expected to continuously decline as shown in figure 1. The decrease in area under forestry plantations, pests and diseases, fire damages and low recovery rates are contributing to the decline in production. These conditions present opportunities for the importation of wood to meet the demand that domestic production has been failing to meet. Furthermore, South Africa softwood production is limited to pine while hardwoods are limited wattle

and eucalyptus. This signifies a production gap for other wood species that are produced in the US. Below is a table that summarizes the commonly imported wood species by South Africa from the US. The table primarily focused on the wood types that Virginia wood exporters are seeking market opportunities for.

While Virginia wood exporters are seeking opportunities to export mainly Poplar, white and red Oak wood species, it is also important to note that South Africa is also importing Poplar from Asia and Europe.

Key industry players from Forestry SA and Calore Fuel who were contacted during the preparation of this report alluded that South Africa is a net exporter of wooden pellets. Wood pellets are expensive to import as they are a volume-based product, not a value-based product. The reason why it is expensive to import wooden pellets is because of high transport costs and fees for importation documents. For these reasons, it is more viable to produce wooded pellets from locally sourced materials than importing. Furthermore, the industry players highlighted that the use of wood pellets as a renewable energy source is still in its infancy in South Africa. Chances of importing wood pellets in South Africa are therefore slim.



1. Introduction

1.1 Summary of request

The Virginia Economic Development Partnership (VEDP) would like an industrial overview of the South African wood and wood products market. The core interest is in potential softwood and hardwood importers in South Africa for primarily Poplar, white Oak and red Oak wood species.

The purpose of this report is to provide Virginia wood exporters with the South African timber industry overview as well as a list of agents/distributors/importers in South Africa for wood and wood products. All the information provided in this report serves as indicators for opportunities that Virginia wood exporters can have in the South African market.

1.2 Balance of Trade (BOT) Export and Imports

South Africa imports from the US as well as exports to the US. According to *Trading Economics*, South Africa imported goods worth US\$5.78² billion from the US in 2019 and exported goods worth US\$2.26 billion to the US. The goods exported to and imported from the US includes wood and wood products. Tabulated in Table 2 below is the value of wood and wood products imported and exported between the US and South Africa in 2019.

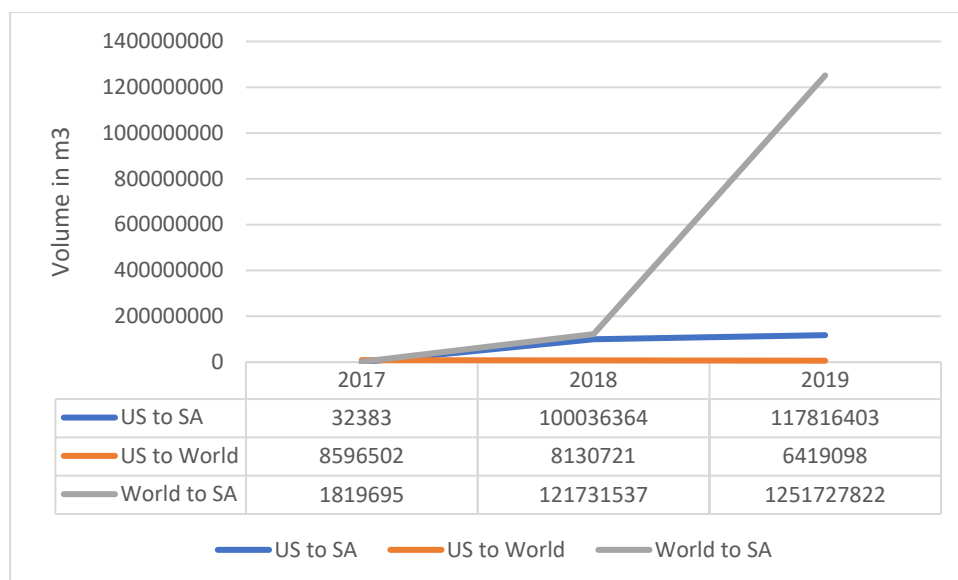
As indicated in the table above, South Africa has a wood and wood products trade deficit of US\$70.76 million. The trade deficit implies that South Africa imports more wood and wood products from the

US more than they export to the US. Therefore, South Africa is a net importer of wood and wood products in the trading relationship by a wide margin.

Without limiting to the value of wood imports and exports, the quantity of wood and wood imports from the US and the rest of the world to South Africa has been increasing as well. Figure 2 below shows three trends of wood imports between South Africa and the US, South and the rest of the world between 2017 and 2019. It also shows the US wood and wood products exports to the rest of the world.

The quantity of wood in the category of sawn or chipped lengthwise, sliced or peeled, whether or not planed, sanded or end-jointed, of a thickness greater than 6 mm imported by South Africa from the US and the rest of the world has continued to increase. According to the data provided by *Trade maps* wood products in this category account for a huge proportion of wood products and wood imported by South Africa. The positive trend might signal an increasing demand for wood in that category from the US.

1.3 Regional imports of wood

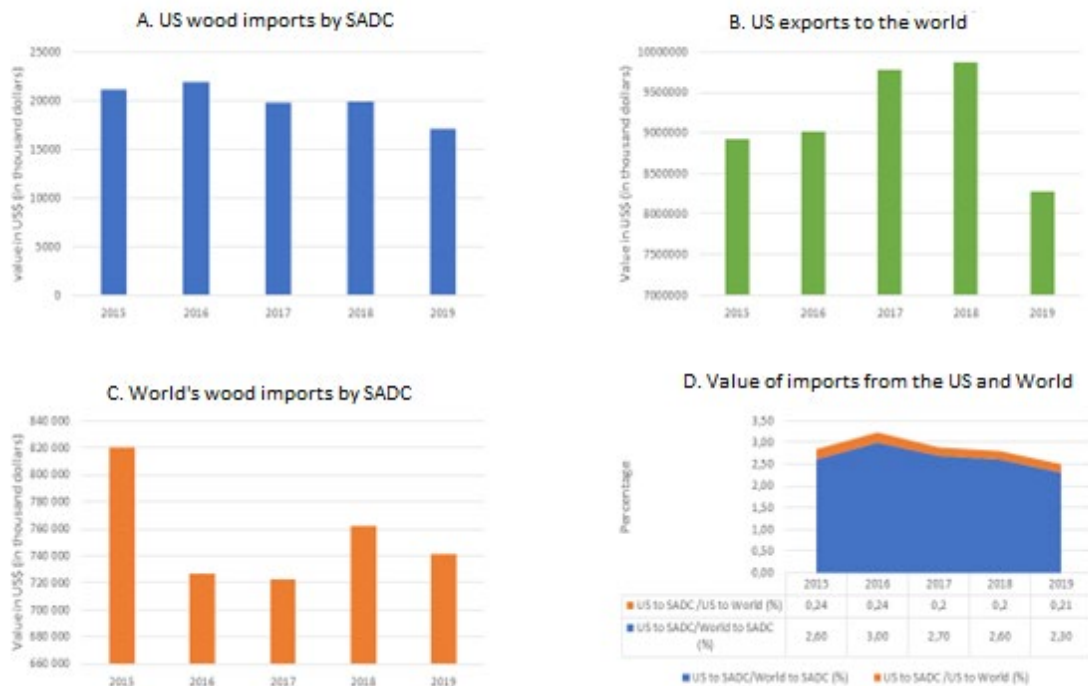
Along with South Africa, the SADC³ region has been importing significant quantities of wood and wood products. This is evidenced by the increasing value of wood and wood products imported in the past

5 years as depicted below. Figure 3 below contains 4 figures A, B, C, and D presented in terms of value (US\$) between 2015 and 2019, the figures show the following;

- Figure A shows the US wood imports by SADC,
- Figure B shows US wood exports to the world,
- Figure C shows the world’s wood imports by SADC,
- Figure D shows the value of imports from the US and the rest of the world to SADC.

In 2019, the SADC region imported wood and wood articles of lesser value than in 2018 as shown by figure A. In figure B, there is a steep decline in the wood and wood articles exported by the US to the rest of the world between 2018 and 2019. In 5 years, the value of wood and wood articles that the rest of the world has been exporting to SADC has been sharply decreasing as shown in figure C. Figure D shows a decline in the value of wood and wood articles exports from the US to SADC as a proportion of the US exports to the world. At the same time, the value of wood and wood articles from the US to SADC as a proportion of the rest of the world’s exports to SADC has also been declining since 2015. Thus, this suggests that the SADC region has been importing less wood and wood articles from the US and the rest of the world.



1.4 Competitors to the US

In terms of trade value, the US was the 4th largest exporter for wood and wood products to South Africa after the United Kingdom, China and Germany in 2018. Gabon, Kuwait, Cameroon, Congo Republic have the largest import share of wood to South Africa. The trade value of the imports, as well as the import share of wood from the US, are tabulated in Table 2. Although the wood species imported by South Africa varies, there are instances where the same wood species are imported from more than one country. For example, Oak is imported from the US and Europe. In this vein, below are the flags for the top 10 countries that South Africa import from by value. It also shows the top 10 wood countries that South Africa is importing wood from by product share.

Some of the countries that South Africa is importing from in terms of value are also in the top 10 countries that South Africa is importing from in terms of the product share. Besides, the countries with the flags below, there are also more than 50 countries exporting wood and wood products to South Africa. The US are likely to compete with some of them, though the type of wood that originates from the other countries might differ from the US.



Tabulated in Table 3 below are the top 10 exporting countries in terms of trade values and of export share (*World Integrated Trade Solution, WITS*).

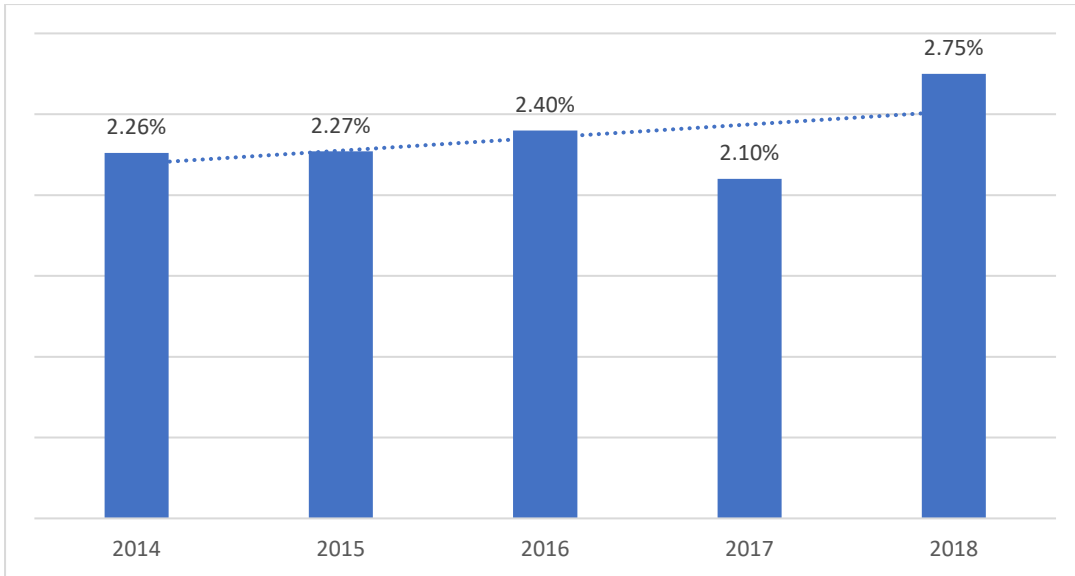

Apart from the United Kingdom, South Africa’s share of wood imports from the US, Germany and China accounts for less than 10% of the total wood imports though they have a relatively high trade value on the market as shown in table 3 above. This might be a testament to the premium quality of wood that originates from the aforementioned countries.

According to the *South African Market Insight*, the total value of wood products, wood pulp and paper imports from the US to South Africa in 2019 was approximately US\$103 million. On the other hand, the *World Integrated Trade Solution* (WITS) statistics showed that the South African wood import share from the US has been showing an increasing trend in the past 5 years as shown in figure 4 below. Although South Africa has been experiencing an upward trend, the SADC region has been generally experiencing a downward trend.

Although not exclusive to the top 10 countries that South Africa imports wood from, the most common wood species imported by South Africa is tabulated below.

From the US, South Africa mostly imports Poplar and Oak wood species. Information on the exact quantity of the Poplar and Oak imported by South Africa is not available. However, there are about 8 active Poplar and Oak importers in South Africa which include Eco Timbers, Interwill Trading International, ITM Timber Merchants, NLA Timber Merchants, Numill marketing, Rare Woods (SA) and Tegn Timbers.

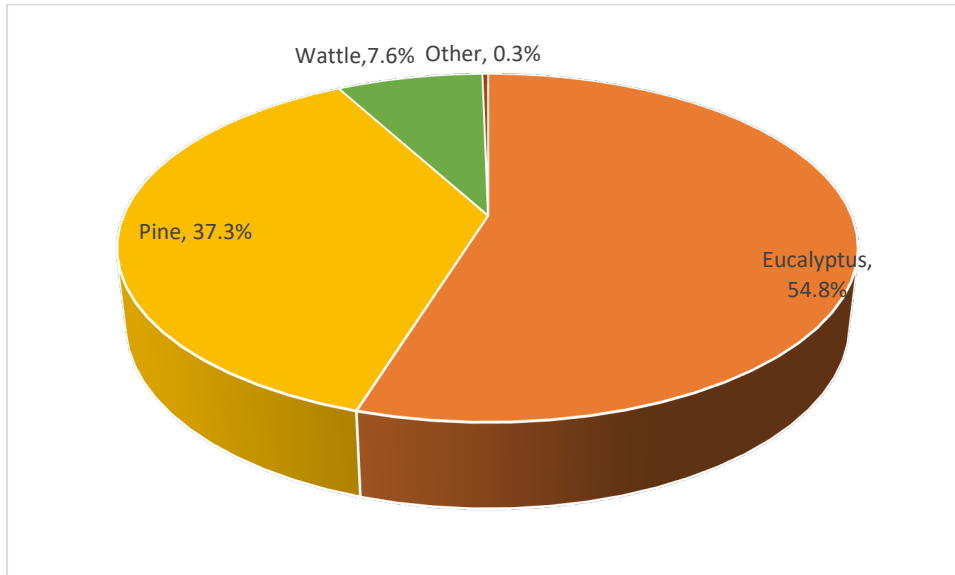
2. Domestic production and consumption

2.1 Production

Approximately 2.9 million acres which translate to about 1%, of the total land in South Africa which is about 302 million acres, is under forestry plantations. Out of the 9 provinces of South Africa, only 4 provinces have forestry plantations which include the Mpumalanga province (1 220 700 acres),



KwaZulu Natal province (1 196 721 acres), Limpopo province (47 261 acres), Eastern Cape province (350 425 acres) and Western Cape province (106 616 acres). The commonly grown wood species in South Africa include Pine, Eucalyptus, Wattle and other species. The production proportion by species is presented in figure 5 below. Pine is predominantly the softwood species grown in South Africa, while wattle and eucalyptus are the common hardwood species grown.

Figure 5: Total production by species in 2018

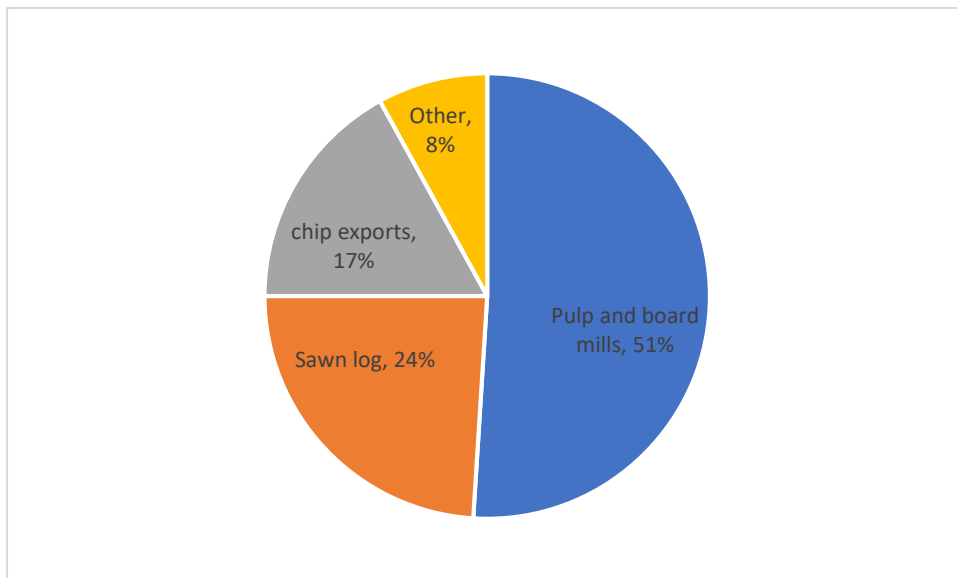
There are three major players in the South African forestry which include;

- Komatiland Forests. Komatiland plantations are state-owned and cover approximately 462 878 acres land area. They are based in Limpopo, KwaZulu Natal and Mpumalanga provinces.
- Mondi South Africa Forests. The forests cover a total of 758 614 acres. Mondi is an international packaging and paper group company with its roots in South Africa and also found in Russia and North America. They have forest plantations located in the KwaZulu Natal province of South Africa
- Sappi Forests. Sappi owns and manages 1 386 261 acres of forests plantations. They are located in the KwaZulu Natal and the Mpumalanga provinces of South Africa.

A high level of vertical integration characterizes forestry industry in South Africa such that plantation owners are also primary and secondary processors. A typical example is Mondi and Sappi forests who are in pulp and paper manufacturing. This implies that many of the primary and secondary manufacturing sectors achieve their market advantage by controlling plantation resources and thereby purchasing their raw material at reasonably competitive costs (*Trade and Industrial Policy Strategies, TIPS*).

2.2 Timber value chain in South Africa

The forestry to timber value chain includes roundwood, sawn wood, wood panels and wood chips. Roundwood is also categorized as sawlogs, veneer logs, pulpwood and fuelwood with sawlogs/veneer logs and pulpwood being the most important roundwood categories. Most of the timber that is produced in South Africa is mainly for the for pulp and board mills, sawn lumber, chip exports to Asia and other uses and depicted in figure 6 below.

Pulp and board mills. By a considerable margin, pulpwood is the biggest part of the local forestry market. At least 50% of the timber produced in South Africa goes into pulp and board milling (*Timber IQ*). Pulpwood accounts for the largest share of plantations and has the highest export value in South Africa. It is led by Sappi and Mondi, which are the two largest pulp producers for the paper sector and they are also global players in this sector. In addition, Sappi manufactures dissolving wood pulp and has a production potential of about 18% of global demand (*TIPS*).

Wood chip exports to Asia. As shown in figure 5, about 17% of the wood produced in South Africa is exported as wood chips to Asia. The *TIPS* report indicates that the annual value of the wood chips exported to Japan is about US\$140 million. According to *Trading Economics*, exports of fuelwood, wood in chips or particles, sawdust, wood waste and scrap to China was US\$15.53 million during 2019. This suggests that South Africa might not be a potential market for imported wood chips.

Sawlogs. Higher quality saw logs go into construction and housing, joinery and furniture, while lower-quality wood goes into several industrial applications, such as crates (*TIPS*). An article by *Timber IQ* alludes that residential roof truss construction in South Africa is the single biggest user of locally produced structural timber such that about 70% of timber is used in the local building market. According to *TIPS*, the bulk of softwood, Pine, is used in the building sector as structural wood.

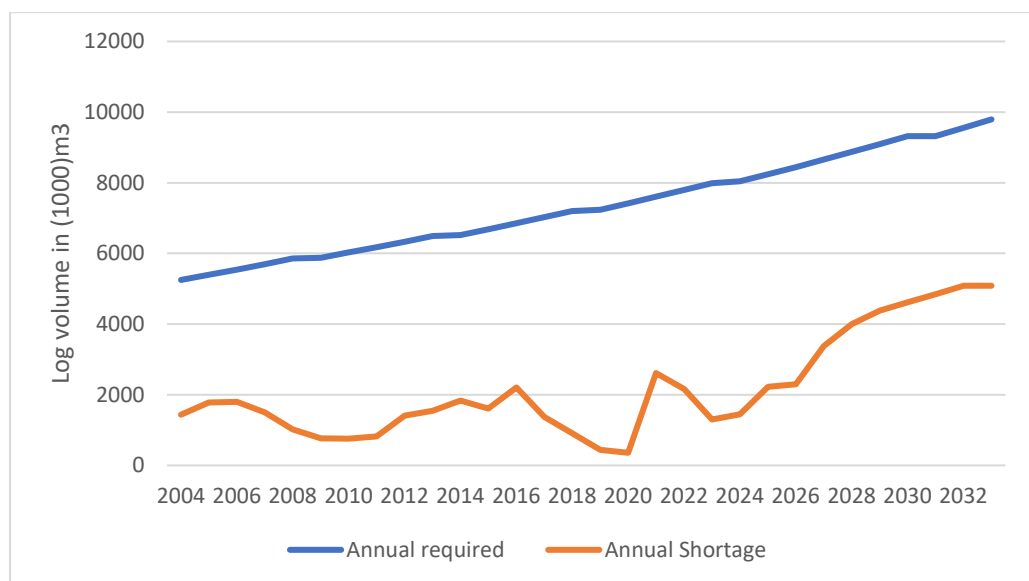
The building construction in South Africa is expected to record a Compound Annual Growth Rate (CAGR) of 4.8% to reach US\$160 billion by 2024. The residential construction in value terms increased at CAGR of 2.3%. Residential construction is expected to continuously grow driven by increased competition between mortgage lenders and low-interest rates offered by the banks. The forecasted growth in residential construction will also drive the demand for construction timber.

Other. In contrast to materials such as pulp, wooden furniture is a comparatively a small part of the forestry value chain. Demand for furniture is highly correlated with rising domestic growth and consumer incomes in Southern African countries such as Tanzania and Mozambique (*TIPS*). According to the *Traffic* report, wooden furniture from China has gained popularity in Mozambique over that from South Africa. This implies that South Africa has lost a part of its market in Mozambique to China.

Also, wood flooring and wooden interiors are still the top trends in South Africa, according to *Habitat magazine*. White Oak, Poplar, and Walnut from the USA (Timber IQ) form the bulk of the wood used for flooring, decking and furniture.

2.3 Demand and supply of wood

Crickmay and Associates projected a 30-year annual demand and shortages for timber in South Africa. Figure 7 below depicts a 28-year projection, between 2004 and 2032 only.

From figure 7 above, the annual demand for sawn logs in South Africa is estimated to continuously show an upward trend in 30 years. Similarly, as the annual demand is increasing, the deficits are also increasing. Approximately 5.2 million m³ of timber was required in 2004 and there was a predicted shortage of 1.4 million m³ that the local market could not service. In 2020, demand for sawn logs was



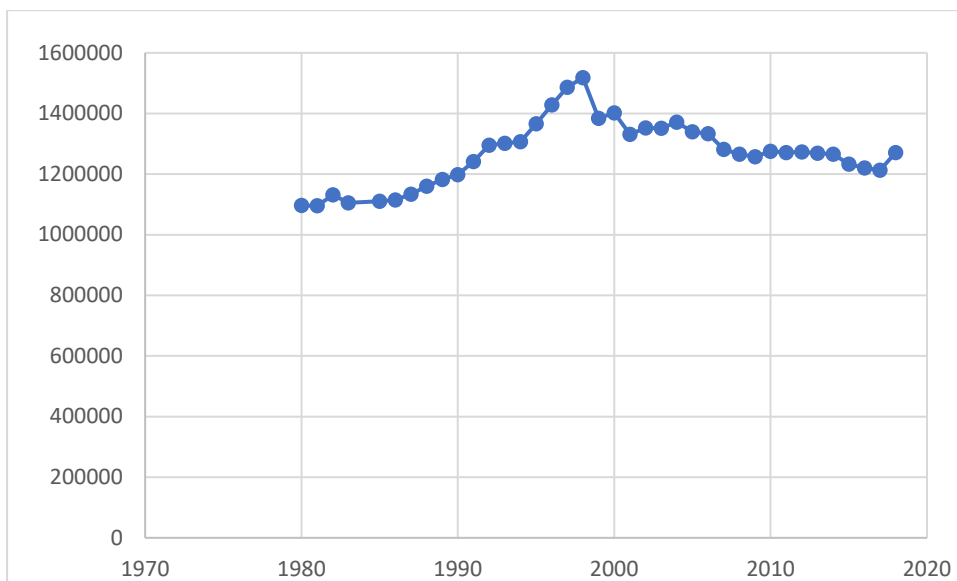
predicted to be approximately 7.4 million m³ and a shortage of approximately 357 thousand m³ is expected.

3. Current trends in the forestry market of South Africa

This section provides a concise discussion of current trends in the timber industry of South Africa that shapes the supply and demand for timber and further present opportunities for US timber imports.

3.1 Decline of the total area under production

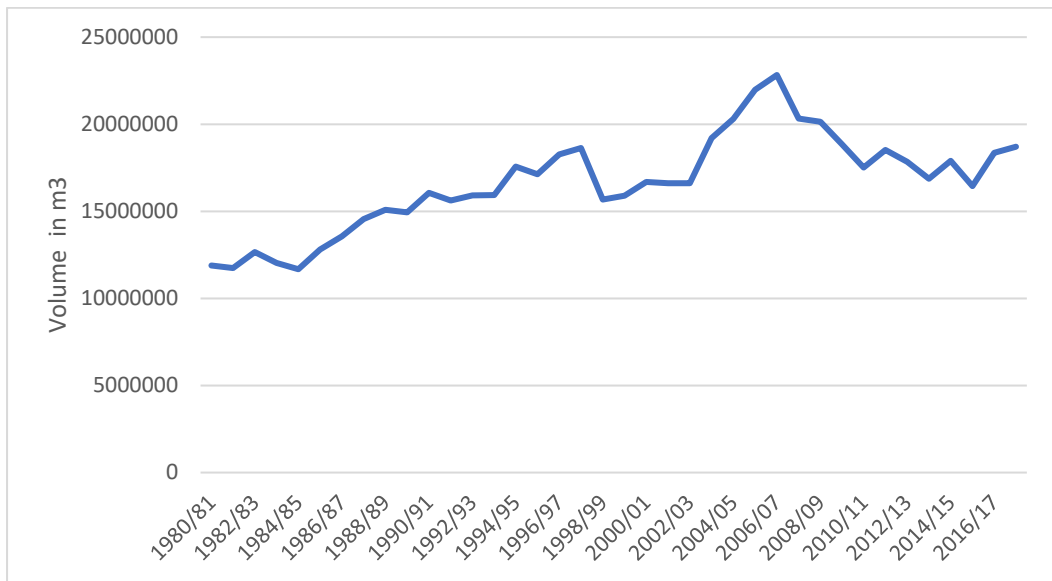
Figure 8: Total plantation area between 1980 and 2018

The total area under forestry plantation has been decreasing over the years. The latest statistics from the Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry (DAFF) show that the total area under forestry production is approximately 2.9 million acres which are approximately 21 times less than the area covered by the US. Depicted in figure 8 below is the area under plantation between 1980 and 2018. Along similar lines, *USDA* report highlighted that the area under forestry production during the 2019/20 market year was approximately 2.94 million acres which they forecasted to decrease to 2.91 million acres during the 2020/21 market year. The report further highlighted that farmers have been replacing timber with citrus, macadamia and avocado trees.

3.2 Decline in production volume

Owing to the decline in the total area planted depicted in figure 8 above, timber production has been declining. During the 2017/2018 market year, total roundwood production was approximately 18.7 million m³. The peak production was 22.8 million m³ during the 2006/2007 market year (*Forestry South Africa*). According to the *USDA* report, the production is predicted to further decline by 20% during



the 2020/21 market year. Figure 9 below shows that the total roundwood production between 1980 and 2018.

3.3 Pests and diseases

The *USDA* report revealed that the damage caused by pests and diseases is also contributing to the decline of production volume. According to *Graziosi et al., 2019*, there are more than 24 non-native insect pests and more than 50 native insect pests affecting the forestry industry in South Africa. In addition to the pests, there are more than 15 pathogens causing damages to trees in South Africa. A new tree pest, *Euwallacea fornicates*, was discovered in South Africa 2 years ago. The pests affect more than 100 tree species including the Eucalyptus.

3.4 Fires

The production of timber in South Africa is also depressed by plantation fires that have been occurring since 1994. It was estimated by *Crickmay and Associates* that plantation fires accounted for an annual loss of 1.5% per annum and increased to 2.2% per annum after the 2003/4 fires that ravaged 59 305 acres of softwood. Fires have continued to destroy plantations across South Africa with the most recent incidences recorded in 2018. Of the 16 803 acres in the Southern Cape, 7 413 acres burned standing with 914 acres of the plantation being under 10 years old. Another 9 143 acres were destroyed by fire in the Western Cape with 2 471 acres too young to be recovered. For these reasons, timber shortages from 2020 onwards have been predicted by *Forestry SA*.



3.5 Low timber recovery rate

According to the *SA Forestry online* report, the timber recovery rate of 49%, in South Africa is relatively low in comparison to the global recovery rate which ranges between 50%-60%. This implies that 51% of the trees are going into waste. Technology-based factors such as the use of obsolete equipment, inefficient procedures, operational procedures and other factors attribute to a low timber recovery rate.

4. Recommendations

4.1 Market Entry Strategies

i. Understanding the South Africa timber market dynamics

Virginia wood exporters need to understand that approximately 1% of South Africa's total land is under forestry plantations which are located in only 4 provinces of South Africa out of its 9 provinces. In South Africa, pine is mainly the softwood species cultivated, while wattle and eucalyptus are the common hardwood species cultivated. Therefore, it implies that South Africa imports other types of wood such as oak and poplar that are in abundance in the US. Moreover, the current production, which has been declining, has not been meeting the current demands and preferences. Contributing factors to the decline in production are discussed in [section 3](#).

Moreover, it is noteworthy that the commercial forestry industry of South Africa is distinguished by a high degree of vertical integration, such that plantation owners are both primary and secondary processors. Mondi and Sappi forests which own approximately 750 thousand acres and 1.3 million acres of forest plantations respectively are involved in pulp and paper manufacturing. This also implies that exporting pulpwood for paper manufacturing might be met with much competition from domestic production.

To gain a deeper understanding of demand and supply dynamics of wood in the South Africa market for a specific product or service, Virginia wood exporters need to understand that;

- ✓ Engaging with key wood and wood products **industry associations** in South Africa and subscribing to **industry publications** is of paramount importance to stay up to date on recent developments and current issues. [Section 7](#) provides a list of industry associations and industry publications.

Understanding the supply and demand dynamics of wood and wood products in South Africa also entails understanding the competition from other wood exporting countries. There are more than 50 countries exporting wood and wood products to South Africa including its neighboring countries like Zimbabwe, Swaziland and Zambia. The value of the top exporting countries for wood and wood products in South Africa in terms of values and import share is provided in Table 3 above. Furthermore, Virginia wood exporters also need to be aware of competition from other US states exporting wood to South Africa.



ii. Establishing a presence in the South African timber market

An Unqualified leads list containing active agents, importers and merchants in the South African market is provided in appendix A. To get an idea of what the market currently has, the leads list will further provide the key products/requirements of each player guided by what their inventory currently contains. These players already have the expertise, documentation, and other pertinent facilities and services required for the importation of wood in South Africa. Figure 10 below shows a snapshot of active agents, importers and merchants for imported Oak and Poplar wood.
